



## Photographer Checklist

Use this list as a guide to remember things that you should photograph on the scene of an accident.

- \_\_\_\_ Street Signs / Address of accident location
- \_\_\_\_ License plate numbers of vehicles involved
- \_\_\_\_ Skid marks from accident
- \_\_\_\_ Roadway conditions (wet, dry, etc.)
- \_\_\_\_ Lighting conditions (day/night, street lights, dark, etc.)
- \_\_\_\_ Vehicles at rest (wide shot of scene)
- \_\_\_\_ Obstructions of vision (overgrown trees, bushes, etc.)
- \_\_\_\_ Sky conditions (cloudy, clear, etc.)
- \_\_\_\_ Actions of parties involved (moving, incapacitated, etc.)
- \_\_\_\_ Extent of vehicle damage
- \_\_\_\_ Location of vehicle damage
- \_\_\_\_ Paint transfer between vehicles

Do not think of this list as exhaustive. It is merely a tool for you to use. Be creative when taking photographs of the scene. Place yourself in the driver's shoes and try to see what they saw. Try to think outside the box. Think as a detective investigating a crime. It is your job to document who was involved, where it happened, how it happened, and why it happened. Some of your pictures might get purchased by simply shooting photographs of the scene, but it is our goal, and we hope it is yours as well, to sell as many of your photographs as possible.
